EDUC 101 Introduction to Paraeducation

This course provides an overview of the field of paraeducation. Topics include roles and responsibilities of a paraeducator, professional and ethical conduct, creating a positive and safe learning environment, understanding the diverse needs of students, interacting with families, and working collaboratively as a part of a team.
