ENVT 240 Property and Mineral Ownership

3 Semester Hour 3 Credits

Course Information

Course Description: This course examines property and mineral ownership. Topics include types of property ownership, mineral ownership in the U.S., rules for conveying property, transferring ownership through court action, and testate & intestate dispositions.

Schedule: This course is a 1st 8 week course offered in the Spring Semester.

Pre/Co-requisite Course: ENVT 140 Introduction to Petroleum Land Management

Course Objectives: It is expected that students will be able to:

- Identify types of estates, types of property, types of owners, and features of joint tenancy.
- Define types of mineral ownership and types of royalties.
- Calculate mineral interests and royalties.
- Demonstrate an understanding of terms relevant to deeds, the elements of valid conveyance, and the importance of recording ownership.
- Distinguish among eleven types of conveyances.
- Recognize and use terminology for property transfer through court action.
- Differentiate between testate and interstate estates and examine cases of both.
