Course Syllabus MUS 207: North Dakota History (3 credits) Fall 2019: MWF 1:04-1:49pm

Course Description: Course follows social and political trends that have influenced the artists who create and have created American Popular Music. Beginning in the late 1950's the course examines major artists, technological innovations, events and cross cultural interactions that shape American popular music.

Course Objectives: By the end of this course students will be able to **explain** in their own words the social conditions that developed distinct genres throughout the 20th century. Students will **identify** musical trends and artistic personalities in a chronological and thematic progression. In doing so, students will acquire and **employ** a working vocabulary of technical terms and musical trends that associate with a specific genre of music.

<u>Identification Quiz:</u> Students will be asked to identify 5 key terms, artists or songs. Each ID has a point value of 2 points per item.

<u>In Class Group Assignment:</u> Students will be divided into groups by the Instructor. While the students will work together as a group, each student must turn in their own written version of the assignment.

<u>Midterm and Final</u>: These assignments will be given to students based upon the content covered in class up to the date of the Midterm and Final. These are NOT cumulative.

Relationship to Campus Theme: This course uses the campus theme of "Nature, Technology and Beyond," in part to explore how music draws inspiration from the natural world. Moreover we explore the complex dynamic relationship between science, nature and art to describe the world at specific moments in time. Using music genres as case studies we can learn more about the development of artistic mediums, iconography and technology on a global scale.

Course Requirements and Assignments:

Grades are calculated based upon a points system and as such include points earned through assignments, in class discussions and evaluations.
