Required Text	Gangs: An Individual and Group Perspective Tobin, Kimberly (2008). Pearson.
Course Description	Exploration of gang activity in the U.S. Examines gang related violence, and the dynamics of gang involvement. Criminological theories that explain the social, economic, and environmental reasons for gang existence are discussed. <b>Prerequisite: CJ 120.</b>
Rationale	This course is designed to provide an understanding of the various motivations to join a gang and participate in gang activity, and how society has responded to their activity.
Course Goals/ Assessment	<ul> <li>* Understand the general tactics and concepts of gangs.</li> <li>* Differentiate between social and criminal gangs.</li> <li>* Be able to identify gang demographics</li> <li>* Identify the relatonship between immigration regulations and gang involvement.</li> <li>* Become aware of the various types of gang activities.</li> </ul>
Materials of Instruction	Gangs: An Individual and Group Perspective Tobin, Kimberly (2008). Pearson.

Requirements	<b>Examinations: Two</b> examinations will be given. These examinations will consist of multiple choice and essay questions. Examinations will give the student the opportunity to demonstrate knowledge of the various gang topics, and will count for 60% of the total grade.
	<b>Assignments:</b> Critical thinking assignments will be given and will comprise 30% of the total grade. One of the assignments will be a 10 minute presentation on a gang topic of your choice.
	<b>Participation:</b> Students are expected to attend each scheduled class. Attendance will be taken every class day. Students should actively engage themselves in classroom discussion topics. Participation will count for 10% of the total grade. Excused absences will not reflect negatively on the student's overall participation grade. Excused absences will be those relating to family death/emergency, being ill, or attending doctors appointments. I must be notified BEFORE class if you will not be attending due to these circumstances. If this is impossible, the absence will need to be discussed at the earliest time to determine its validity. Whether it is excused or not, all absences will be reported to student services.
	Extra Credit: Extra credit opportunities will be offered throughout the semester, and will be posted on the course main page.
