Nursing

The faculty are committed to assisting you to access educational opportunities that will help you be successful in the nursing profession. Student nurses study in hands-on practical lab and clinical experiences with a local instructor along with classroom instruction delivered over Interactive Video Network (IVN) and online formats. There are three locations for you to choose from: Bottineau, Minot, and Valley City. Upon completion of the program, you will be qualified to apply to take the National Council Licensure Examination (NCLEX), as required by all State Boards of Nursing.

Why study nursing?

The demand for qualified, safe and effective nurses is critical throughout North Dakota—most visibly in rural areas. Our purpose is to prepare students for nursing careers who practice safely and effectively in health care systems to meet the needs of clients. This program of study begins with an 11-month Certificate in Practical Nursing (LPN) and then advances to the Associate in Applied Science Nursing Degree (RN). Before getting started, you will need to apply to the program. The annual application period is December 1 – March 5 for fall admission.

Career choices

Employment is found in hospitals, nursing homes, health centers, and private clinics, as well as a variety of other settings.

Focused courses for your degree

This program focuses on courses specifically for nursing and include fewer of the general education courses required in an AS degree.

Courses you will study include: Foundations of Nursing; Practical Nursing I, II, III; Clinical Practice I, II, III; and Introduction to Maternal/Child Nursing.

The Dakota Nursing Program prepares students to be able to work under the supervision of a registered nurse, advanced practice nurse, or a licensed practitioner. - Standardized Test of Essential Academic Skills (TEAS) with a score in Basic level or higher
- TOEFL or Duolingo exam required for all applicants for whom English is not their native language or who have not attended 4 years of US high school and achieved a HS GPA of 3.0 or higher.
