Course Description: Guided practice in college-level writing, reading, and critical thinking

Pre-/Co-requisites: None

Course Objectives: Students will be able to write in different essay types or genres or a variety of audiences and in a variety of contexts. Students will be aware of and will practice inventing, planning, drafting, and revising. Students will read closely and analyze what is read. Students will begin to learn to find and evaluate information resources, then integrate and acknowledge sources in their writing. Students will learn to work collaboratively with others and will apply a variety of inventions and review techniques to their own and each other's writings.

Faculty	 Determine if the use of generative AI could enhance student learning in any assignment of project. Clearly indicate in all course syllabi if generative AI is allowable for any academic work. If allowable, give specific parameters for how and when generative AI may be used. If a violation of generative AI for the individual course/syllabus is suspected, discuss the concern with the student. If violation is still suspected, inform the appropriate semester coordinator/program director.
