CALL FOR CONSERVATION AWARD NOMINATIONS

The Earth Day Committee and Natural Resources Department of is putting out an all-call for 2026 Conservationist of the Year nominees. The annual Conservation Award will be presented during the spring 2025 DCB Earth Day celebration on April 24.

DCB has developed a Nature, Technology, and Beyond focus which grew from its founding mission in 1906 of providing educational programming for students choosing a career that promotes care and concern for the environment. This focus is uniquely expressed in the college's original mission that prescribes practical and efficient training in forestry, horticulture, agriculture, nursery, and greenhouse practices, advocating for a

trained eye to observe and a skilled hand to execute.

Carried through today's values, remaining student-focused and community-centered.

The DCB Conservation Award is presented to an individual who has demonstrated leadership and made notable contributions to the conservation, preservation, and enhancement of precious natural resources or to the education of such principles to instill a passion in the next generation. This person exceptionally contributes to the development, promotion, and implementation of projects and activities, making a significant impact on the common good. Through their efforts, this individual inspires and leads the way toward a more sustainable and environmentally responsible future.

There were two award recipients in 2025. The first recipient was Angie Bartholomay, whose work in Environmental Education was a

national model for others to follow. As a retired DCB professor, Angie worked tirelessly to share the knowledge of environmental ethics and practice with her fellow educators as well as thousands of youth and young adults throughout the state. Angie inspired a love of the environment and inspired many of her students to engage in careers in natural resources. The second recipient was Monica Yoder, who received the Young Conservatist Award. Monica, whose volunteerism in the realm of natural resources was impressive, graduated with an AS in Natural Resources and her AAS in Wildlife and Fisheries Tech.

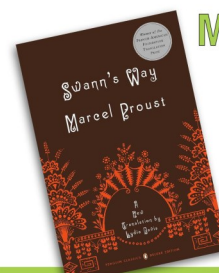

SPICE HOSTED FOCUS GROUPS

On January 7, SPICE hosted two focus groups to help with strategic/implementation planning. Over the past three years, DCB has operated with a one-year Implementation Plan which aligns with the current Strategic Plan. Although one-year planning is valuable, DCB needs to include long-term planning. Inspired by this, focus groups with representation from all areas at DCB met to discuss:

- 1) What academic programs should DCB consider adding.
- 2) What improvements to facilities need to happen to improve our college.
- 3) What are some ways DCB could strengthen community connections, and
- 4) What is one thing DCB needs to do to adapt to changes in higher education?

Here is a synthesis of the focus group discussion. Across Bottineau and Minot, participants consistently emphasized:

- 1) Workforce-Driven, High-Demand Programming

- Strong support for CTE, trades, health sciences, and public safety programs.
- Desire for short-term, accelerated credentials (8-week CNA, EMT, CDL, welding, HVAC).
- Interest in clear pathways (high school → DCB → MSU/workforce).
- Caution against adding programs without sufficient demand or sustainability.

2) Facilities as a Limiting Factor

- Aging labs, outdated equipment, and fragmented spaces are inhibiting program growth.
- Athletics and student life facilities are viewed as both enrollment drivers and community assets.
- Minot participants emphasized consolidation, modernization, and student support spaces, while Bottineau participants stressed residential, athletic, and infrastructure needs.

3) Community Connection as a Strategic Asset

- Strong desire to deepen partnerships with:
 - K-12 schools (dual credit, internships, camps)

- Local employers and healthcare providers
- Community organizations and events
- Marketing and visibility—especially in Minot—were seen as critical gaps.

4) Need for Strategic Focus and Adaptation

Participants called for DCB to:

- Identify and invest in a clear niche
- Use program review data to sunset low-demand offerings
- Improve internal coordination between Bottineau and Minot
- Expand flexible delivery models (high-flex, accelerated, IVN)
- Treat dual credit as a core growth strategy, not a side function

At both the January and February Campus Conversations, we aim to formalize and prioritize items brought up during focus group discussion. We are looking forward to the participation of the entire campus community in this endeavor, so please try to attend.

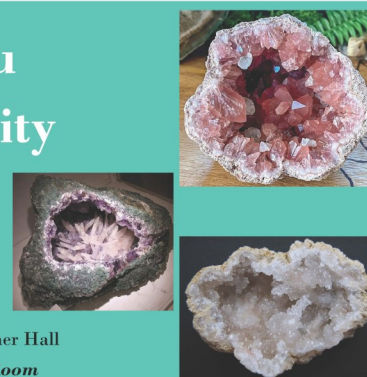
