Message to students:

- In order to support students during the Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic, DCB student health will be providing limited services to students until further notice. Please contact the student health nurse (701-228-5460) if you have questions.  - Stay home if you feel sick.
 - If you have symptoms (fever, cough, or shortness of breath) call your provider. You can also call the NDDoH COVID-19 Hotline at 1-866-207-2880 for questions or concerns.
 - o Please call prior to visiting your medical provider.
 - The student health nurse does not collect or test for COVID-19.
- DCB student health nurse is here for you if you have questions. Information about COVID-19 is rapidly evolving. Watch for symptoms

Reported illnesses have ranged from mild symptoms to severe illness and death for confirmed coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) cases.

The following symptoms may appear **2-14 days after exposure.**

- Fever
- Cough
- Shortness of breath

*This is based on what has been seen previously as the incubation period of MERS-CoV viruses.
