Momentum in Fall 2025

Enrollment and programming are looking great this fall for Dakota College at Bottineau (DCB). I'm pleased to report that our enrollment continues to rise, reaching 1,242 students this semester.

Last spring, we celebrated the graduation of our first cohort in the Dental Assisting program. This fall, we're excited to have our second cohort of Dental Assisting students underway, along with the first-ever cohort of Dental Hygiene students—both housed in our Dakota College Downtown campus in Minot.

Renovations are in progress to fully transition our Paramedic Program into the Downtown campus by January. This renovation will offer three fully operational programs Downtown Minot. Everyone involved is excited to have these programs consolidated under one roof to enhance collaboration, create efficiency and student experience.

Our Nursing program continues to stand out for DCB, recently earning recognition as the third-best program in North Dakota and the top-ranked two-year nursing program in the State. Currently, we have 51 Practical Nursing students and 20 Associate Degree Nursing students across our three locations: Bottineau, Minot, and Valley City. We're proud of our continued growth and student success in the health professions.

DCB applied and was awarded money for new programs titled Workforce Education Innovation

Funds and we will be launching a Medical Laboratory Technician program in the fall of 2026. This program will be based at our Health Center West location in Minot representing another strategic expansion of our healthcare offerings serving the regional workforce needs.

Following the legislative session, we were fortunate to receive funding to renovate our residence halls. Although we didn't receive the full amount requested, we secured enough to begin renovations in Milligan and Mead Halls. These renovations began last summer, and have significantly improved the living experience for our students.

DCB continues to operate as an affiliated campus of Minot State University and one of the eleven institutions within the North Dakota University System. I'm honored to serve in this interim role and continue to support the mission and values of DCB; *to provide a quality education in a caring environment, while demonstrating integrity, engagement, inclusion, and passion.*

Four Generations of Family Choose Bottineau

Attending college in Bottineau is a tradition that Karen (Bohl) Brandvold married into, with her children among the third generation taking classes on the 118-year-old campus. Karen is a 1988 Elementary Education graduate of NDSU-Bottineau who was inducted into the school's Athletic Hall of Fame in 2007.

Recruited by NDSU-B



As a senior at Towner High School, Karen received recruitment calls to play basketball at the college level. Donald Thompson, known as Coach D.T., reached out to her from NDSU-B. "I got the opportunity to meet D.T., and he had the most endearing smile and his blue eyes sparkled. I had a tough decision to make, but I knew after my visit that NDSU-Bottineau was going to be my new home

and my new family," explains Karen. "I really liked the idea that it was close to home and that it was a smaller campus."

Some of her fondest memories on campus are of her time playing with her fellow Ladyjacks. "Coach D.T. treated us like his own daughters. He always cared about us and pushed us to be the best on the court and in the classroom. My teammates were my best friends, and they always were encouraging and fun to be around," says Karen.

She was surprised and excited to be a freshman starter at the beginning of her two-year stint playing for NDSU-B. One of her most special memories happened while playing as a freshman, when the Ladyjacks beat Williston State College for the first time in the school's history in that division. Karen made 16/16 free throws during the game and set a conference record. "I don't know if my record is still standing or if somebody broke it. Williston was the other school that recruited me to play basketball. Winning that game was like winning a championship game," she says with pride.

Brandvold Family Tradition

Though she loved attending NDSU-B, Karen didn't know the important role Bottineau would play in her future. As a sophomore she met her future husband, Bob, who also attended NDSU-B. His parents, Marvin and Janis, attended North Dakota School of Forestry in Bottineau together. Bob's aunts, Helen and Donna, also attended the North Dakota School of Forestry and met their spouses, Lee Taylor and Gary Molander, there. Bob and all seven of his siblings attended college in Bottineau. Ten of the Brandvold siblings' children also attended Minot State University-Bottineau or Dakota College at Bottineau. Four out of five of Karen's and Bob's children are among the third generation to choose Bottineau. The fourth generation has already arrived at Dakota College at Bottineau. Josie Wintermute, a second cousin to Karen's and Bob's kids, plays basketball like several of her family members before her.

Married for 36 years now, Karen and Bob have carried on the Brandvold tradition of welcoming local college students with home cooking and fellowship. "Bob's family members and our family always invited students for meals, snacks, visiting, and various family activities. People still talk about all the delicious meals and fun they had at the Brandvold's Farm," Karen says with a smile.

Bottineau Campus Over the Years

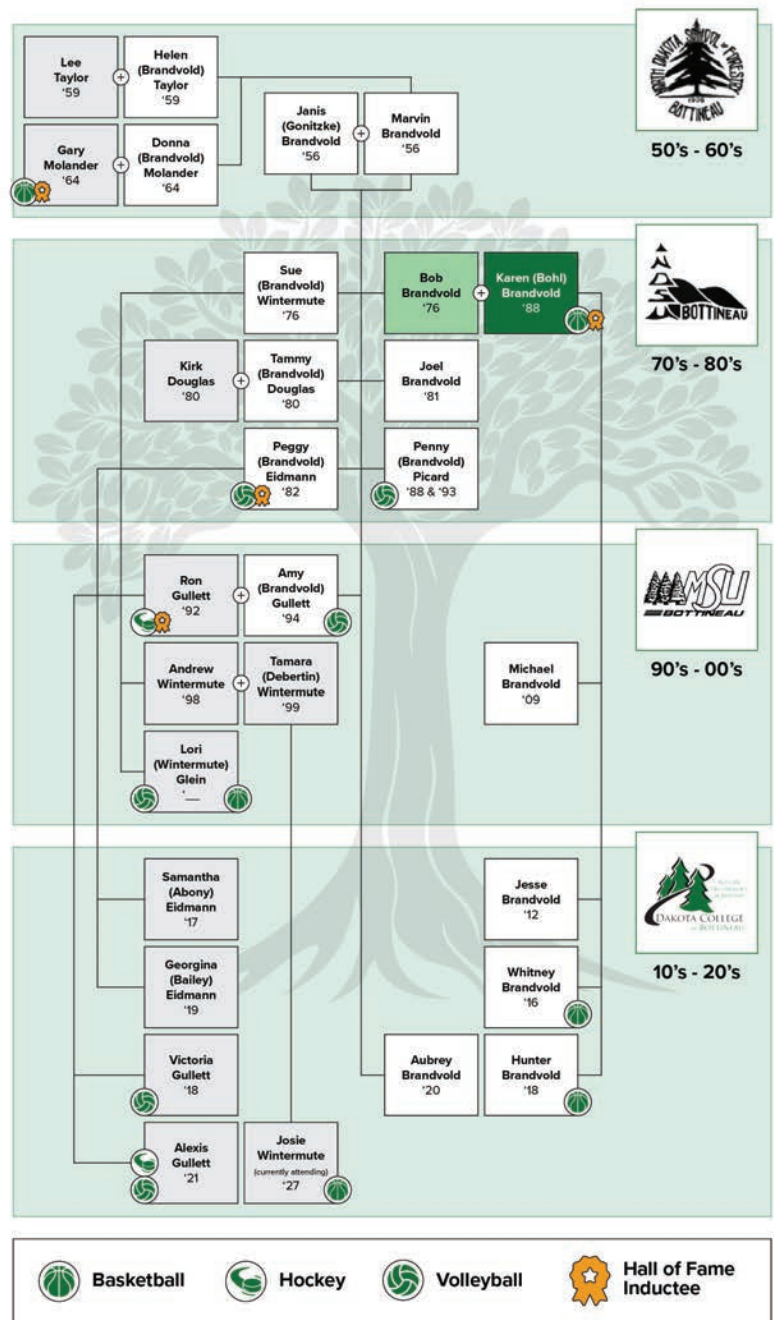
Though many things have changed since Karen attended NDSU-B, some things remain the same. Instead of the quarter system, DCB has semesters. Old Main is still a focal point of the campus, but instead of humanities, economics, and history classes, the renovated building is home to the DCB nursing program. There is a new cafeteria, and the dormitories have been updated. "When our daughter Whitney went to DCB, she stayed in the same dorm room I did when I went to NDSU-B. That was pretty cool," says Karen. "Our children actually had some of the same instructors that were there when I attended college!"

The entire Brandvold family had great experiences at Bottineau. Karen and Bob's son Jesse says of his time at DCB, "It was a good steppingstone. The smaller classes made you feel like you were important and not just a number. Teachers and professors knew who you were. Also, you could meet all the students at the college and get to know them on a personal level. For people who don't know what their major is or are undecided, it is a great place to get the most out of your investment until you decide. It gives a person the opportunity to consider lifetime careers."

Reflecting on her time at NDSU-B, Karen says her college experience led her to a career she loves and made Bottineau her home.

A Solid Place to Start

After graduating from NDSU-B, Karen earned a B.S. in Elementary Education from Minot State University. She began her career working part-time as a substitute teacher and helping Robert milk cows and farming. She spent six years teaching fifth grade at the Ojibwa Indian School where she also coached 5th and 6th grade girls' basketball. In 2006, she focused on being a mother while helping on the farm and ranch. During this time, Karen began coaching junior varsity and varsity basketball at Bottineau High School. After 10 years, she transitioned to coaching at the fifth and sixth grade level. For the past 16 years, Karen has taught in Bottineau Public Schools and has coached at the 5th and 6th grade level for more than 30 years.

"I really enjoy living and working in Bottineau because it's the most beautiful place, especially with the rolling hills and scenic view by Lake Metigoshe. The people are friendly and caring. Anytime people need a helping hand, everyone pitches in to help," Karen says. The Brandvold family knows this firsthand, after losing their home to a fire in 1995. "The fire department, first responders, and people from the community and all around helped us to rebuild our lives again. Due to all their gifts and generosity, my family could move on from the tragic loss. We are so blessed and grateful to everyone who has continually touched our families' lives. I wouldn't want to live anywhere else. Everyone looks out for each other and takes care of each other. I feel so lucky and blessed to live in Bottineau."

Whether she's talking to a former student or a member of her family who is considering what to do after high school graduation, Karen's advice is, "open yourself to life's opportunities no matter how 'big' or 'small' they may seem. Attending NDSU-B wasn't part of my original plan, but it's the best choice I ever made. I am so glad I followed my heart." The rest of the Brandvold clan would likely agree, with 29 members and counting who chose Bottineau.

Karen Brandvold lists several professors from her time at NDSU-Bottineau who made a deep impact on her as mentors and lifelong friends. "Professor Chuck Lura was the reason I passed my Biology Lab. Mr. Leno and his wife taught me so much, and we are the best of friends today. Gordy Lindquist has touched so many lives as an amazing music teacher, pianist, and is a friend to all he meets. Jack Woods was my math instructor who was another impactful teacher in my life and within the Bottineau community. Jack Woods and his wife Patti came to all the college basketball games and took pictures. Jack was there the year my daughter Whitney and her team won the District Championship to go to Nationals. and he took a picture of Whitney and I together. Arnie Beaver, Howard Proutty, Les Wagner, and Ona Monson were also my best friends in college and in the community, but sadly some of them have passed," says Karen.

Last but certainly not least, Karen remembers Coach D.T. as her best friend, coach, and mentor who stayed in close contact with her after she graduated. "We shared family memories, coaching advice, and lots and lots of words of love and encouragement and lots of tears and endless hugs. I am so lucky to have had him in my life. I miss him so much."

Travis Rybchinski - Ice Hockey Coach

In 24 seasons at the helm of Dakota Bottineau, Travis Rybchinski has led the Lumberjacks to seven national championships in 10 national tournament appearances as a coach. Rybchinski picked up his 300th career victory in January 2022. A native of Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, Rybchinski has been named NJCAA Coach of the Year seven times.

Gary Warren coached the Lumberjacks for 15 seasons and racked up quite a reputation during his time at Dakota College at Bottineau. Gary took the Lumberjacks to the national championships 12 times during those 15 years, 3 of which ended in a national championship title.

Friend of Dakota College at Bottineau Award Recipient

The Friend of Dakota College at Bottineau Award is presented annually to an individual who, though not necessarily an alumnus, has demonstrated exceptional support for DCB through time, resources, and service that make a lasting impact on the college and community. Colonel (Ret.) Al Wondrasek embodies this spirit through his dedication to Dakota College, his service to veterans, and his leadership within the Bottineau community.

A proud alumnus of the North Dakota School of Forestry, Class of 1971, Al has been a longtime supporter of DCB and an active member of the DCB Logrollers, attending as many athletic events as possible. He played an integral role in the recent Old Main renovation project, visiting the building weekly to track its progress, sponsoring a room, and purchasing multiple tiles inside the facility. His commitment to the success of the college and its students has made him a true friend of the DCB family.

Al's service extends far beyond the campus. A retired U.S. Army Colonel, he currently serves as the Director of Bottineau County Veterans, where he was instrumental in relocating and upgrading the Veterans Memorial Hall. He also designed more than 100 aluminum can collection sites across the area, a program that has recycled nearly six million cans to help sustain the Veterans Hall—a project that continues to benefit the entire community.

In addition to his veterans' work, Al remains active in supporting civic and youth programs, including Boys and Girls State and local American Legion baseball. His leadership, generosity, and unwavering enthusiasm for both his community and Dakota College at Bottineau exemplify the values of service, dedication, and pride that this award honors.

Halle Serhienko

Young Alumnus Award Recipient

The Young Alumnus Award recipient must have attended Dakota College at Bottineau within the last 15 years, be successful and show growth and promise in their chosen career, contribute in a beneficial way to community and/or society in general, and set a good example in the community. Halle Serhienko exemplifies each of these qualities through her dedication to education, leadership, and service.

A 2014 graduate of DCB, Halle was an active member of the LadyJacks Volleyball team for two seasons and participated in numerous student activities during her time on campus. Her enthusiasm, teamwork, and academic excellence made her a standout student and a valued member of the DCB community.

Following her graduation, Halle earned her teaching degree and built a meaningful career as a high school English teacher at Bottineau Public School. Beyond the classroom, she contributed to student life through coaching and leading the Student Council in activities and fundraising efforts, helping to build school spirit and community engagement.

Halle also continues to make a positive impact at Dakota College. As a member of the Evergreen committee for the past three years, she has played an important role in ensuring the success of the DCB Foundation's signature event—securing donations, organizing gifts, and managing activities that support scholarships and programs for current students. Halle has joined the DCB faculty this fall as an English Instructor.

Brian Kalk

Golden Service Award Recipient

The Golden Service Award is given annually to someone who attended DCB, is at or approaching traditional retirement age, and has had a successful career or exceptional achievement that benefited their community or society. Brian Kalk's remarkable career exemplifies the purpose of this award.

A Bottineau native, Brian grew up hunting and fishing with his family, developing an early appreciation for North Dakota's natural resources. His father's 40-year career with North Central Electric also influenced Brian's lifelong interest in energy and environmental stewardship. He began his higher education journey at NDSU-Bottineau Branch—now Dakota College at Bottineau—on a hockey scholarship that set the foundation for his future success.

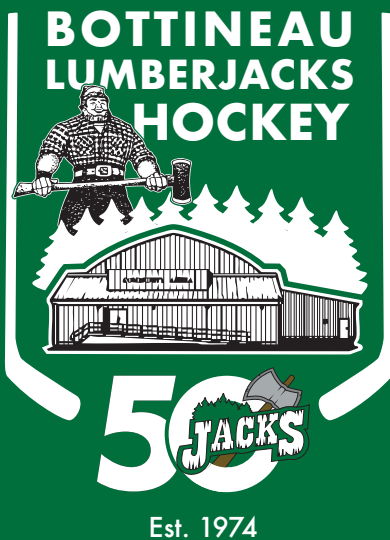
After his freshman year, Brian's desire to see the world led him to enlist in the U.S. Marine Corps, where he began a distinguished 21-year military career that took him to 48 countries. His service strengthened his dedication to energy security and natural resource preservation. While in the Marines, Brian earned a degree in Political Science from Campbell University,

completed Officer School in Quantico, Virginia, and later received a Master's in Environmental Engineering from North Dakota State University. He served as Environmental Officer at Camp Pendleton, California, and later as the Officer in Charge of the Military Entrance Processing Station in Fargo, North Dakota. During this time, he also completed a Ph.D. in Natural Resources Management from NDSU—an impressive achievement while still on active duty.

Following his retirement from the Marines, Brian continued his commitment to public service and education as a professor at NDSU, teaching Environmental Policy and Natural Resources courses. His leadership and expertise led him to serve eight years as a North Dakota Public Service Commissioner before joining the University of North Dakota's Energy and Environmental Research Center (EERC) as Director. He later served as Executive Director of the NDSU Research and Technology Park before returning to the EERC, where he currently serves as Chief Research Officer, developing innovative solutions to today's critical energy challenges.

Brian remains a proud supporter of Dakota College at Bottineau, frequently attending Evergreen and giving back to the institution where his journey began.

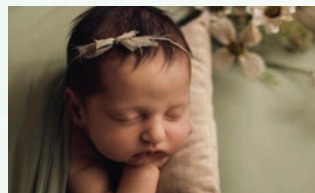

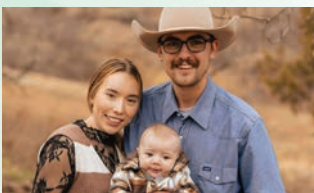
